Their parents and/or caretakers are encouraged to volunteer for this time and use the special skills and knowledge they possess to staff the carnival games.

a car and killed on Halloween than on any other day of the year. Don't let that statistic deter you and your family from scouring the community for the best candy stops, but there are things we can do as parents and conscientious community members to make sure we have a fun and safe Halloween.

- Make kiddos and costumes visible. Carry glow sticks or flashlights and adorn costumes with reflective tape.
- If you're driving on Halloween night, be alert and slow down. Cross streets at corners or crosswalks and use sidewalks when accessible.
- When selecting a costume, choose an outfit that isn't too flowy. Long capes and sleeves can get caught in hazards and could catch fire when near open flames. Make sure costumes are the right size to prevent trips and falls. Also, make sure costumes are flame-resistant.
- Masks are great accessories, but they can limit a child's vision. Instead of a mask, opt for non-toxic face paint.
- Be careful when toddling from house to house, and only go to well-lit houses. Halloween is an exciting time

for kiddos, but try not to rush. Decorations like tombstones (although festive) can also be tripping hazards.

• Supervise children 12 and under.

Feeling overwhelmed by the idea of trick-or-treating? Dr. Mollie Grow, a pediatrician in Seattle, offered a fun list of activities for families to try on Halloween that you can enjoy from home.

- Make fall recipes as a family
   —give kids the opportunity
   to pick a recipe and make it together.
- Take on a special craft project as a family.
- Enjoy a special Halloween movie night.
- Do a family game night in costumes.
- Trick-or-treat around the house to find hidden candy.
