

An Issaquah-based developer has submitted plans to the city to construct a six-story assisted living facility just north of the 8th Avenue NW and Richmond Beach Road intersection in the area where the abandoned bank building now

stands. The project name is Acoya at Richmond Beach.

The existing bank building would be demolished as would most of the west wing of the existing retail building (Beach House Greetings, Grace Nails and Santa Fe Grill, but maybe not the Sno-King Cleaners).

Let go. Let it all go and flow with the grace that washes through your days whether you receive it gently or with all your quills raised to defend against invaders.


Take this on faith; the mind may never find the explanations that it seeks, but you will move forward nonetheless.

Deadline to participate

If you would like your sale placed on a garage sale map, please email your street address to Elisabeth at garagesale@richmondbeachwa. org by Monday, April 29. If you live in Hillwood or Innis Arden, your address will fall outside the map, but the address can still be listed online at yardsalesearch.com, so feel free to participate if you wish. If you miss the deadline and decide at the last minute to hold a sale on May 4, you will benefit from the traffic in the neighborhood and can put out your own signs to direct people to you.

When you email me that you would like to be on the map, I will reply within 48 hours and ask you if you would like to receive a link from yardsalesearch to customize your site. You will be able to list your items, describe them and include photos. You can customize this information up to the date of the sale. If you are not feeling like learning new software, no worries, your address will still be on the map online and the printed map. People will arrive at your sale surprised at your wonderful treasures! Sales will be viewable online (yardsalesearch. com) beginning in mid-April and printed maps starting on Thursday, May 2.

Examining our purpose as a community association

The Richmond Beach Community Association is celebrating 116 years of service to our community. At our 2024 annual board retreat in January, we spent a significant amount of time discussing our purpose as a board. We are finalizing our thoughts and will share them with all you in the next issue of the paper.

However, in preparing for that discussion, I spent some time looking at several of the RBCA's legacy in the community to inspire us in our thoughts and conversations. Perhaps residents who would have joined the neighborhood in the last decade would appreciate a brief historical trip back through time here in Richmond Beach and nearby neighborhoods. The immediate area from Aurora/Highway 99 to the Sound was called Richmond at the turn of the last century.

Some historical memories

The community and the Richmond Beach Community Association have a long history. A read through the text of *Shoreline Memories Volume 1* gives a peek into what the little town of Richmond Beach was like a century ago.

In 1900, there were 150 residents and around 35-45 households in the town. In 1901, there were 35 pupils in the one-room schoolhouse, Grades 1-8. Thenresident Goldie Crawford describes the Richmond Beach of her day:

"Richmond was a thriving little town even then. We had a hardware store, three grocery stores and a dry goods store. We had three hotels, a barber shop, a shingle mill, a feed store, a drug store, a post office, a library and a shipyard on the Point. By 1917, we could use the Yost bus service to get to Seattle. It was sixty cents for a round trip." ¹

Of course, Richmond Beach has changed since then! Now, we are a neighborhood of 2,700 households with over 3,300 residents (as of the 2020 census).

The Richmond Beach Community Association goes back to the same period. It has changed names with the times, but the original Washington State charter is still active.

The initial incorporation of the Richmond Beach Social Club was registered with the State of Washington in 1908 for "social meetings and the maintenance and conduct of a social club."

The club was reincorporated as a non-profit organization in 1958 and named the Richmond Beach Community lub. These are the purposes of the revised club:

"The objects and purposes for which this corporation is formed are as follows:

- (a) To promote the welfare of the community of Richmond Beach and to encourage civic betterment among its residents.
- (b) To initiate, sponsor and conduct social, educational, athletic, recreational and community activities of every kind and character, and to establish, conduct and maintain a club or clubs for these purposes and for any other lawful activity.
- (c) To lease, purchase, or otherwise acquire, and to construct, maintain and operate buildings, recreational and athletic grounds, parks, playgrounds, bathing and swimming beaches, tennis courts, club houses, bath houses, gardens and grounds.
- (d) To conduct any business, social or commercial, which may seem to the corporation capable of being conveniently carried on in connection with the activities or facilities of the corporation, provided that none of the proceeds of such business shall be diverted to private profit or advantage."

Richmond Beach was an established community by 1958. Article II of the charter also includes extensive provisions for doing business, as this organization was functioning as a quasi-governmental organization at the time. The community club of that era functioned as the local fundraisers for projects and events. They were the parks and recreation organization for the community. They were hosts for the community meetings.

Richmond Beach was incorporated into the city of Shoreline when the new city was adopted by voters in 1994. The October issue of the *Richmond Beach Community News* included an article by then-President Pat Hendrix, which stated the next phases of activity as Richmond Beach adjusted to its role in the new city of Shoreline:

"We're a city! And it happened by a smashing margin! Now is not the time to be complacent. The RBCC (Richmond Beach Community Club) is more important than ever. We want to maintain the ambiance of Richmond Beach and Shoreline. In order to maintain our quality of life we must serve as a direct conduit to the new city council particularly in this formative period. We need people who will be willing to serve on committees such as zoning, land use, crime prevention, public works projects, licensing, parks and recreation, transit planning, and traffic control. Remember, you must be an activist if you want to preserve what we have. We want Richmond Beach to have direct representation on every issue."

The community club rewrote their bylaws; and by 2010-13, the organization was officially named the Richmond Beach Community Association. As the community and association recovers from Covid 19, events and meetings recommence and the association is revitalizing its service and vision for the community. In January of 2024, the board of the Richmond Beach Community Association reaffirmed our purposes. You are invited to actively support and participate as we move forward.

The RBCC Players will be offering musical summer camps for youth and adults this year at Richmond Beach Congregational Church. The programs will be directed by Cyndi Thomsen (Managing Artistic Director and coproducer) and founding/current coproducer Carol Colt.

Through storytelling and dialogue with others in a non-threatening environment, The Players' first summer camps will give young people the chance to share their concerns about their world: June 24-28 in the morning for ages 8-11; two afternoon segments, one for ages 12-14, the other for high schoolers.

Thomsen and Colt know that folks out of high school also need a safe place to artistically express themselves. This summer on August 24-31, a camp is planned for ages 17 through centenarians. One goal is to offer a free performance from what transpires there. Ages 5-6 workshops and after-school programs are in planning stages.

For many years Thomsen codirected with and acted under The Players founder, Dan Shelhamer. Shelhamer also nurtured Thomsen's drive to give children and youth safe spaces to express themselves.

Thomsen has a lifetime of experience in theater. Her first

directing role was in 8th grade, and her first acting role was in the 10th grade as lead in a play. Thomsen continued acting through high school while also working with Minneapolis Guthrie Theater. In college, she majored in psychology with an undeclared minor in theater. Besides working with The Players, Thomsen has acted in, stage managed and directed many other plays with different groups. She also is an experienced personal development and acting coach who helps bring out one's inner talent.

Thomsen's experiences overcoming early obstacles to artistic expression in school inspires her work with the Players. Thomsen recalls she was told in grade school that she had no singing talent, but she became a music student in the 5th grade after winning a competition for singing on pitch and note finding. This early experience taught her to be kind to people taking the risk to artistically express themselves. Her own painful experiences in elementary school, plus her work with at-risk and homeless youth, further inspires her to serve young people.

May 2024 is the 40th year anniversary of the RBCC Players. The Players will present *Mary Poppins* on June 7 and 14 at 7:30 p.m. and June 8 and 15 at 2:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Tickets available at *showtix4u.com/event-details/81772*. (*Mary Poppins*

is presented through a special arrangement with Music Theatre International (MTI), and authorized performance materials are supplied by MTI (*mtishows.com*).

If you want to join The Players, here are important dates for the production of *Mary Poppins*: Respond ASAP for stage manager (a production assistant role including production meetings, auditions, rehearsals and performances); for production team and orchestra pit, respond by March 15; auditions are by appointment March 24, 25, 26.

Since the King's Players folded, The Players are Shoreline's only remaining community theater troupe. Thomsen and Colt are committed to keeping it alive and welcoming community members. Regardless of age, Thomsen's message to aspiring thespians: "Inside you is the talent. I will support you and help you share it with others. The Players will welcome you. So please reach out to me."




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
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The overall number of homes for sale remains at a historic low. Many "would be sellers" find themselves leasing their homes instead of selling since most have interest rates between 2.5% and 4.5%. New construction housing is also at a historic low.

The combination of these factors is what keeps housing prices. Ask me or your lender about a 2/1 loan buydown or seller credits towards lending. These are helpful strategies for buyer's payments during the first two years. The plan is to refinance once interest rates further decline as expected in 12 to 18 months.

The Greek Kitchen, Starbucks, Swedish Clinic and QFC are not in the area to be developed. The Shell gas station, Shoreline Natural Medicine, Rachel Alexander Insurance and the Tae Kwon Do studio also remain outside the project area.

The project plans call for 123 parking stalls in a below-grade garage, a ground floor with offices, common areas, back-of-house functions like food preparation and five additional floors of residential units. The west side of the building facing 8th Avenue NW is required to have each story stepped back so there will not be a six-story wall along the street edge (see picture on page 1).

The city completed preliminary review of the application and sent the developer a 44-page correction letter on January 10 listing numerous areas where the application did not meet code standards or the information provided was not complete enough to determine whether the standards had been met. The developer has until April 9 to either submit revised plans that show compliance with the identified issues or to ask for an extension of the April 9 deadline. As of mid-February, the developer had not yet replied to the correction letter.

The city received almost 400 comments during the short two-week comment period, setting a new record for the most comments received on a development project.

As part of the corrected application, the city's correction letter asks the developer to include responses to all public comments entered during the comment period. There have also been over 50 comments sent in after the comment period closed. You can still submit your comments to Alicia Halberg, the city's project manager for the application, at ahalberg@ shorelinewa.gov. Everyone sending in comments is placed on an email list and will receive an update when the city determines if the project requires an environmental impact statement.

Work on the existing buildings and property cannot start until the city issues all the necessary permits. Given the length of the city's correction letter, it is reasonable to expect several additional rounds of review and correction before the application can be approved and the permits issued. If the application is approved and the permits are issued, it will be up to the developer to decide how quickly work starts.



Carrot Cake with Buttermilk Glaze and Cinnamon-Cream Cheese **Frosting**

12 servings

The glaze is poured over the sheet cake while it's hot, giving it a rich, moist texture.

Cake

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp baking soda
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- ½ tsp salt
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 large eggs
- ³/₄ cup buttermilk
- 3/4 cup vegetable oil 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 2 cups coarsely grated peeled carrots
- 1 ½ cups unsweetened flaked coconut 1 8-ounce can crushed pineapple in iuice
- 1 cup coarsely chopped unsalted pecans

Glaze

- ½ cup sugar
- ½ cup buttermilk
- ½ cup (1 stick) unsalted butter
- 1 tbsp maple syrup
- 1 ½ tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp vanilla extract

Frosting

- 1 ½ 8-ounce packages cream cheese, room temperature
- ½ cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, room temperature
- 1 1-pound box powdered sugar
- 1 tbsp brown sugar
- 1 ½ tsp vanilla extract
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon

Cake Directions

• Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Spray a 13x9x2-inch baking pan with vegetable oil. Whisk the first 4 ingredients in a

medium bowl. Beat sugar, eggs, buttermilk, oil and vanilla in a large bowl until smooth. Beat in dry ingredients. Fold in carrots, coconut, pineapple with juice and pecans. Transfer batter to prepared pan.

Bake cake for 30 minutes, tent loosely with foil. Continue to bake until the tester inserted in the center comes out clean, about 15 minutes longer. Remove from the oven. Using a bamboo skewer, poke deep holes all over the cake.

Glaze Directions

Meanwhile, bring the first 5 ingredients to boil in a large saucepan, whisking until sugar dissolves. Continue whisking to avoid liquid to spill over the pan and burn. Boil until the glaze is deep amber, whisking often 3-4 minutes. Glaze will thin out Remove when almost done. from heat: mix in vanilla.

Spoon hot glaze evenly over warm cake. Cool cake completely in the pan. You can place it in the refrigerator overnight, covered, and frost the next day if needed.

Frosting Directions

Whisk cream cheese and butter in a large bowl until fluffy. Add powdered sugar, brown sugar, vanilla and cinnamon; beat until blended. Spread frosting over cooled cake in pan. Cake can be made 1 day ahead and chilled. It will be good in the refrigerator for 1 week.
