If you make it up the big hill, you will have earned an extra dinner roll or two.

Health and safety protocols

The RBCA is currently working with the City of Shoreline to follow all health and safety protocols. Masks will be required at the start and finish lines. You are encouraged to practice social distancing—so run fast away from others or plan on starting at a different time to avoid crowds. More information will be provided as the event gets closer.

Logistics

Run, jog, walk through scenic Richmond Beach on Thanksgiving morning, rain or shine. The course for joggers/runners is 3.4 miles/5.5 km and a shorter 1.6 mile/2.6 km course has been planned for walkers. Park in the bottom lot or walk with others and meet at the entrance to the Richmond Beach Saltwater Park at 8:30 a.m. for warm-up and instructions. Dress for the weather and in costume for the pajama theme (optional). Participants will be off and running at 9:00. This is a free event, but please consider making a suggested \$5 per participant donation to help fund events like this in the community.

held in the past at Syre Elementary School.

The Pumpkin in the Park event is structured to be an outdoor event with more of a country down-home feel. We will be working with the current health and safety guidelines, and possible mud and inclement weather.

Kids are invited to show off their costumes for this event; adults are encouraged to dress up too! Parking is limited, so please walk if possible. Tickets for most attractions are \$1 and may be purchased with cash or credit cards. All games and attractions are paid for with tickets. This is a fundraiser for the RBCA, and we need a lot of support.

Soft opening for kids with special needs

Children who have a particular way of seeing, hearing, moving, feeling, thinking or perceiving the world are often not comfortable attending functions such as this due to the commotion of large crowds and noises. To make the event accessible, kids with special needs and their families are invited to the park early for one hour from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. to play carnival games in a less busy environment while also allowing any modifications possible to meet their skills and abilities. Please be aware the park's surface could be muddy or wet.

Volunteers and equipment needed

We need volunteers, individuals, families and businesses to make this event happen. The event is four hours; please consider volunteering for at least one two-hour shift. You can even sign up to volunteer for the whole event! The RBCA is also looking to borrow pop-up tents/canopies to cover the event's attractions, plus folding plastic tables.

High school volunteers needing community service hours are encouraged to volunteer.

Treats needed

It takes over 100 treats to make the treat walk (formerly known as the cake walk) a success. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, all items will need to be store bought and sealed; and because it is a "treat" walk this year, we will go beyond cakes. Consider donating other new packaged prizes like soccer balls, toys, books, snacks or other special items. Cakes, cupcakes, cookies, candy bags and gluten-free sweets are still needed, but cannot be homemade. Bring your treat donation with you when you come to the Pumpkin Patch.

The ribbon cutting ceremony for the Shoreline Historical Museum's new Collections and Research Center was held September 18, 2021, with masks donned by all attendees, including representatives of local governments.

The Collections and Research Center is the first phase of construction completed in a two-phase construction program, which began in 2012. The next phase of construction will begin with fundraising.

The center will house the museum's archives and collections for research and exhibits. The museum also offers research services online at shorelinehistoricalmuseum.org.


According to the museum's website, the non-profit Shoreline Historical Museum was begun in 1975 as a bicentennial project for the community that was encompassed by the Shoreline School District. At that time, the United States government charged every community across the U.S. with accomplishing a commemorative project that would be a permanent reminder of the birth of our country. Many communities chose to start local historical institutions where the history of this nation could be both

preserved and used by the public for educational purposes.

Shoreline School District Superintendent Bill Stevenson, teacher Kay Bartholomew and preservationist and historian Barbara Monks were three of the key players in getting the museum started. The Shoreline Historical Society also contributed greatly to the project along with many teachers and community members.

The historic 1912 Ronald School at 749 North 175th Street was the first home of the museum.

After the Ronald School building was purchased from the museum by the Shoreline School District for re-purposing as part of Shorewood High School, the Shoreline Historical Museum moved to its current location at 18501 Linden Avenue North.



It's Labor Day weekend, and today is tomato taste testing day at the Calvin Presbyterian Community Garden. The church's community garden group generously shared five beds and plots in their patch with a group of student volunteers. The young folks have been working all summer long to help cultivate and maintain the fine neighborhood garden we drive past every day.

Today a small group of local students will be learning to pick tomatillos, taste some of the different varieties of tomatoes

they've grown and learn the basics of seed-saving. With the din of the traffic on the corner of 3rd Avenue NW and NW Richmond Beach Road next to the bus stop, they settle in for a quick lesson and tomato tasting. "I've learned so much about the food we eat all the time. It's a whole world I didn't know existed," said one local middle school student.


The youth volunteers are middle- and high-school students, mostly from around the Shoreline area, though some come from as far-flung as Lynnwood to participate. They come once a week and meet with local gardening expert Callie Steward and volunteer extraordinaire Dawn Hamid. Together they learn

everything from the hows and whys of composting, to the different varieties of fruits and vegetables that grow locally and how to cultivate them, to what they're used for once they've been harvested. High school students have the opportunity to use the time they spend working and learning in the garden as credit toward volunteer hours for school. "It's like school, but more fun," says one Shorecrest freshman.

The group has regular harvests, with some of the food going to several local food banks and some going home with the volunteers. Group members are asked to research recipes and ways of preparing the food that they bring home and to prepare a dish and post it to the group via group chat, which the students are also responsible for maintaining and participating in.

With gardening season coming to a close, the group is making plans to continue meeting regularly throughout the school year to maintain their space. Their plan is to carry on through the winter and continue into the spring.


Richmond Beach orcas migrating to storage for the winter

Bloodworks stressed by shortages

Bloodworks Northwest reports that reserves are extremely low, and there is a critical need for whole blood, platelets and plasma. The typical summer slowdown came after a year in which the usual, robust blood collections were hampered by the pandemic... which continues to depress donations. The organization's network of temporary "pop-up" donor centers has successfully met the most critical demand, but the usual margins for emergencies and disaster response are vanishingly thin.

Myriad disasters across the U.S.—wildfires, floods, hurricanes—mean that the more fortunate areas of the country, like Western Washington, are vital to sustaining the blood supply.

Sidewalk project for 20th Avenue NW moves to design phase

The City Council approved a \$311,389 contract on September 13 to complete the design for the much-needed sidewalk on 20th Avenue NW between Saltwater Park and Richmond Beach Road.

The project description calls for a paved 10-foot-wide shared use path on the west side of the street plus two 10-foot-wide travel lanes for vehicles. The project work will include improving storm water drainage and new ADA sidewalk ramps at NW 190th, NW 193rd and NW 195th.

The contract is for design only and is expected to be completed in nine months from the start date. Actual construction will wait for additional funds to be made available in a future city budget.

Environmental issues focus of Shoreline Candidate Forum on October 5

The League of Women Voters of Seattle-King County and Save Shoreline Trees, a Washington state non-profit organization, are co-sponsoring an online forum with four candidates running for Shoreline City Council. The candidates are Laura Mork, Eben Pobe, John Ramsdell and Chris Roberts (incumbent). The forum will be held as a Zoom webinar and will be conducted according to League of Women Voters guidelines. The date of the forum is Tuesday, Oct. 5, 2021, from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m.

The forum's focus will be environmental issues, including climate conditions now impacting the City of Shoreline, the importance of reducing greenhouse gas emissions and how to preserve Shoreline's mature conifer and native trees. Each candidate will have a two-minute opening statement followed by a prepared question-and-answer segment pertaining to environmental issues. Audience questions on any subject may be submitted via the Q&A Zoom function. The League of Women Voters moderator will ask all questions.

Even though all four candidates are running unopposed for the City of Shoreline Council positions, citizens are encouraged to learn the candidates' views on the environment and immediate and long-range solutions to the dramatic climate conditions we are now experiencing.
